Those of you that attended the July meeting heard briefly of my concern over the direction that the IR/WA's education is taking. To be clear, I am not against education. Given our tax exempt status, we are **VERY** limited in how we are able to raise funds that will sustain our chapter operations. While we are financially stable at this time, eventually, these types of practices will cause us a rise in chapter dues to sustain basic chapter operations. I

intend to make this a priority at both the Fall and Spring Forums at Region 1.

Also, as President, I have discussed a variety of ideas for improving this Chapter with your Board, and they have agreed that at least one should be pursued. We have asked your Professional Development Committee to develop a Mentorship Program and present at least a basic frame work to the Board in the January meeting.

The idea is that the more experienced members could be paired with newer members to assist them not only in their development at their personal work environment, but also to guide them on a path to education and designation so that each may benefit from such associations and as a result our chapter grows stronger as well.

About this Newsletter, let's personalize it, let's make it more "user friendly." Do you have a funny story that happened on the job? Cartoon? Photos? Paper you've written? Other ideas? This is a Chapter Newsletter, anyone can contribute, and I encourage you to please do so. 

Man Spends Two Years Building Exact Titanic Replica from Scrap

1:100 scale replica of the Titanic. The 40-year-old used all kinds of scrap materials, from old clockworks to broken VCRs and managed to finish his masterpiece on April 15, exactly 100 years after the real Titanic sunk.

Titanic buffs have built replicas of the famous boat before, but Jason King wanted his to be perfect, right down to the number of benches on its deck. To pull off his perfect 1:100 replica, the man actually bought 150 books

on the Titanic and consulted every photo of the vessel he could find. Jason knew most people would never notice the tiny details, but he wanted to make sure no one could ever “pick holes in it”. So he painstakingly recreated every single part of the original Titanic to scale, right in his home study. Although he admits he had some model experience behind him, the Titanic project still took him two and a half years to complete. But that actually kept him out of his wife's way, so that made her happy.

In what can only be described as a titanic effort, boat-model enthusiast Jason King, from England, has spent two and a half years building an **exact**






Market Activity

I-11: Highway to Opportunity

Amid last week's news of two significant Supreme Court decisions, Congress ended a three year ordeal and passed a long-awaited extension of highway and transit funding. After nine prior extensions of the 2009 transportation bill, a final, one-week extension was filed to provide sufficient time to obtain President Obama's signature. The bill, which has been touted as providing "unprecedented reforms," is valid for only two years as opposed to the optimal five years necessary for effective long term planning. After all the political wrangling, the bill finally awaits the president's signature.

A significant accomplishment of the federal transportation bill is its inclusion of language designating the Interstate 11 corridor – making the corridor, which would serve as an interstate connection between Phoenix and Las Vegas, eligible for interstate highway funds.

Governor Jan Brewer, with support from Arizona's congressional delegation and numerous public and

private partners, has been actively pursuing the designation of Interstate 11 since her arrival in office. In January's State of the State address, Governor Brewer highlighted the I-11 project and its importance in promoting commerce, tourism, and trade across the western United States. The project serves as a "cornerstone in her jobs and economic development agenda" – playing a key role in establishing Arizona as a competitive player in the global market.

The I-11 project also supports the Arizona Chamber of Commerce and Industry's key long-term economic development initiative known as, the **Arizona Southwest Project**. This project's central focus is to create an Arizona commercial, business, services and logistics regional HUB serving the southwestern USA and northern Mexico. The Chamber is actively moving forward with strategic implementation plans for this critical statewide and regional project.

Considering the popularity of both destinations, it's

hard to believe that Phoenix and Las Vegas remain the largest cities in the United States not linked by an interstate highway system. When the Federal Highway Transportation act was enacted in 1956, Phoenix, Las Vegas, Reno, and Tucson had a combined population of a mere 700,000. Today that number has grown to 8 million and continues to increase as people from all over the world discover the greatness of eternal sunshine and a booming metropolis.

As population in the western United States grows, trade between the U.S., Mexico, and Canada continues to thrive. Total trade between the three countries reached more than \$919 billion in 2010 and is projected to increase substantially as Mexico continues port expansion.

So, as the situation currently stands, we have two popular tourist destinations, both with growing populations and ideal locations between bustling lines of international trade. What we don't have is a sufficient highway system

connecting the two to make the flow of commerce efficient and competitive.

By connecting Phoenix to Las Vegas, and potentially expanding access north to Canada and south to Mexico, Interstate 11 puts Arizona at the center of new opportunities for commerce, tourism and trade. I-11 would create more efficient trade connections between five of the fastest growing metro areas in the U.S.: Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, Las Vegas and Phoenix. It would connect major trade hubs, existing and future domestic and international deep-water ports, and intersecting trans-continental roadways and railroad corridors.

On a micro level, I-11 would alleviate congestion in the Valley by providing a route for truck traffic around the Phoenix metro area. This is a key benefit as an expansion of the Mariposa Land Port of En-


try in Nogales is estimated to triple the number of trucks driving through parts of Arizona and Nevada, further creating traffic delays and running roadways ragged.

And most notably, according to an estimate of the 2040 travel demand, I-11 would usher 5,000-24,000

The ease and connectivity of Interstate 11 will help solidify Arizona as the destination for business in the Southwest. It will create opportunities for manufacturing, distribution, real estate development, transportation, construction, retail and more. It will create jobs, encourage global investment and increase long-term economic stability.

The development process of I-11 is bound to be long. Engineering and environmental studies will commence this summer, with construction beginning no sooner than 2017.

For now, we await the president's signature and celebrate the possibility that lies ahead.



Coral Castle

Location: Miami, Florida

Claim to Fame: Billy Idol's 1986 hit "Sweet Sixteen" was a tribute to the Coral Castle and its creator, and the video was shot at the Castle.



Ed Leedskalnin spent 28 years secretly working alone, mostly at night, with just hand tools to move 1100 tons of coral to construct this monument to the woman who jilted him the night before their wedding. It remains a mystery how he accomplished the feat. Since no one ever witnessed the construction, some have speculated that Leedskalnin had supernatural powers. Leedskalnin himself claimed to know the secrets used to build the ancient Pyramids. Coral Castle was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1984 and is now a museum listed under its original name of Rock Gate Park.

Eminent Domain, Imminent Disaster?

Radical Method Proposed for Restructuring Mortgages Has its Detractors, Proponents

Both mortgage credits and investors in residential mortgage-backed securities (RMBS) could take a significant hit should California jurisdictions decide to pursue one of the more radical methods proposed for addressing the lingering housing crisis and begin seizing mortgages through eminent domain, bankers and bond rating agencies are warning.

Of particular concern are proposals that focus on borrowers who are current on their existing mortgage obligations and who would otherwise continue performing as expected but for the ability to re-

structure their mortgage via eminent domain, a legal principle giving states the authority to seize a citizen's rights in property with due monetary compensation, but not necessarily with the owner's consent.

The board of supervisors of San Bernardino County recently voted to form a joint powers authority with area cities to explore using eminent domain to seize mortgages on underwater homes and restructure the loans to reflect current home values. Fontana, CA and Ontario, CA joined the joint powers authority.

Because eminent domain provides a mechanism for local, county, or state governments to seize mortgages at their market values, the holders of those seized loans could experience losses if these communities proceed.

"The radical use of eminent domain to take over underwater mortgages could cause a spiraling effect of withdrawal of mortgage credit, declining home values and a threat to local economic recovery," wrote David H. Stevens, president and CEO of the Mortgage Bankers Association, in an op-ed column in The San Bernardino Sun this week. "Rather than taking actions which increase uncertainty, reduce the availability of credit and focus on the

problems from the past, policymakers should look to homebuyers of the future and do what they can to efficiently get the process moving again."

"If eminent domain were used to seize loans and force losses on mortgage investors, it would set a dangerous precedent that could dry up credit for mortgages in San Bernardino County," Stevens argued. "Investors in mortgage-backed securities would suffer immediate losses and likely be reluctant to provide future funding to borrowers in these areas."

The Securities Industry and Financial Markets Association (SIFMA), which represents hundreds of securities firms, banks and asset managers, also came out against the proposals. It has said that it would look to excluded. Fannie Mae, Freddie Mac, and Ginnie Mae loans originated in jurisdictions that exercise their power of eminent domain to acquire mortgage loans.

Still, with the protracted problem in housing values proving resistant to other solutions, the proposal has its backers.

"SIFMA's decision is entirely unwarranted by its own purported purposes, and its decision - if carried out - would vio-

late a number of consumer protection laws," argues Mortgage Resolution Partners (MRP), a community advisory firm working to stabilize local housing markets and economies by keeping as many homeowners with underwater mortgages in their homes as possible.

MRP is run by Graham Williams, CEO, who was previously a senior vice president and director of residential lending at Bank of America in the 1990s, and CEO of a \$4 billion federal savings bank during his tenure with ITT Financial Services.

MRP's approach included voluntary participation on the part of the homeowner and would target loans trapped in private securitization trusts and avoids mortgages whose owners have broad powers to reduce principal, such as banks and government agencies.

According to Fitch Ratings, because San Bernardino is the largest county (by area) in the country, the impact of its decision could be broad. In these three areas of California combined, \$14 billion worth of non-agency mortgages and more than 46,000 of the loans have mark-to-market combined loan-to-value (MTM CLTV) ratios of more than 100%. Roughly half of those underwater mortgages are current.

One proposal indicates that only those current and delinquent mortgages, not those in foreclosure, would be acted on.

If the usage of eminent domain were to proceed, it could be adopted in other regions and have a significant impact on the RMBS sector, Fitch Ratings said.

In California alone, there are over 590,000 non-agency borrowers with MTM CLTVs more than 100%, for an aggregate \$241 billion in debt.

Across the entire U.S., the figure climbs further to 2.2 million borrowers and \$589 billion underwater.

In addition to pushing forward losses on performing loans, such a program could also have other unintended consequences including negatively affecting mortgage interest rates and credit availability in affected areas, Fitch Ratings said.

Likewise, the implementation of this program could further weigh on private investor confidence and appetite for private-label mortgage-backed securities going forward, it added.


